

2018!! Welcome to the New Year! The first of January is the beginning, according to the calendar that we follow in the USA. The Gregorian calendar, as it is known, was adopted in 1592 and is a solar calendar. That means that dates are indicated by the position of the earth as it revolves around the sun.

It is of course not the only calendar around. Russia, India, Korea, and Ethiopia all use different calendars (to name a few places). There are cosmic calendars, geologic calendars and even fictional calendars. It is always interesting to me as we discuss dates on the calendar when on Sundays, the church pays attention to the **liturgical** calendar. The liturgical calendar began last December with the start of Advent. In January, we will continue into Ephiphany and the Sundays after Epiphany. Usually in the newsletter, there is a page informing you of the worship schedule and the liturgical day. By mid-February we will leave Epiphany and go into Lent.

The days of Epiphany focus the readings on the way Jesus was revealed to the people. It highlights how the followers of Jesus do not fully understand who he is. A pattern of identification of Jesus and invitation to be disciples continue.

We are reminded of when Jesus prayed that "they may be one so that the world may believe." (John 17:21) We don't just see Christ, we believe and tell others what we know to be the truth revealed!

IN THE GALLERY...January-February The General Slocum Disaster, Cindy Vojnovic paintings

An unbelievably tragic event happened on June 15, 1904. This incident was the worst tragedy, with the most lives lost in NYC until 9/11. Sadly, few people seem to know about it - even here in the Mid-Atlantic area of the United States where we live. It is a story of human error, greed and corruption.

St. Mark's Lutheran Church in lower Manhattan had chartered *The General Slocum Steamboat* for an afternoon on the East River when a fire broke out. The boat was seventeen years old and had never been inspected. The life jackets did not work, fire hoses had rotted and the life boats were nailed to the walls. Approximately 1,100 people died, mostly women and children,

either by drowning or being burned to death. The congregation never recovered from such a loss nor did the lower east side.

Easton artist, Cindy Vojnovic, was living in New York City in the 1980s and was so moved by this tragedy that she decided to do a painterly interpretation of the incident. When she began her research she found little more than newspaper articles on microfilm. No books had been written about such a horrific event. That was prior to the 100th anniversary and before the publication of *Ship Ablaze* by Edward O'Donnell. Three "instant books" were done almost immediately after the disaster but even the reference librarian at the New York City Public Library main branch was unable to find them. It took from 1987, when Cindy decided to paint this story, until 2014 for her to do the first painting, "Retrieving Bodies." One reason for this was grappling with just how to visualize scenes of such unspeakable horror.

Cindy has spent several years on this project and only recently completed the 22 paintings that make up the exhibit which will be on display at The Gallery at St. John's during January and February 2018. Cindy will give a brief talk during the Opening Reception. She is very pleased to be showing this in a Lutheran church since this tragedy took the lives of so many Lutherans. Cindy has had inquiries from at least two galleries in NYC that are interested in the exhibit.

RIC Sunday January 28, 2018

The ecumenical community which welcomes people of all sexual orientations and gender identities celebrates each year in January RIC Sunday. RIC stands for Reconciling in Christ. Reconciling in Christ (RIC) is a program of Reconciling Works. This year the theme is 'Dreams and Vision of the Church Re-imagined.'

Since 1974, advocates looked for ways for Lutheran communities of faith to answer the inclusive call of the Gospel by welcoming people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. Currently, there are 630 RIC settings in the United States, with 540 of them being congregations. From the By-Laws:

Featured Committee – Membership Committee.

It shall be the responsibility of this committee to review the membership rolls of the congregation, to seek to recruit members into active participation in the various activities and functions of the congregation, to care for and minister to members in time of need, and to develop opportunities for members to respond to the love of God in Jesus Christ through regular and consistent financial support of the ministries of the congregation.
