On Christmas Day, 1863 Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was America's most famous and beloved poet. Though not so popular today, many of us may remember from high school English having to memorize some of Longfellow's most famous lines, like this verse from his

Song of Hiawatha:



"By the shore of Gitche Gumee, By the shining Big-Sea-Water, At the doorway of his wigwam, In the pleasant Summer morning, Hiawatha stood and waited."

Even more familiar, Paul Revere's Ride:

"Listen, my children, and you shall hear Of the midnight ride of Paul Revere,"

or from- The Village Blacksmith,

"Under a spreading chestnut-tree The village smithy stands; The smith, a mighty man is he, With large and sinewy hands; And the muscles of his brawny arms Are strong as iron bands."

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was the son of American royalty – his mother was the daughter of a Revolutionary War hero and his father a prominent lawyer in Portland (what is now Maine but then still part of Massachusetts) and later a member of Congress. Upon his graduation from Bowdoin College, Longfellow's education continued with a three -year sojourn in Europe. Upon his return to America in 1831 he married a former classmate, Mary Storer Potter, who would die four years later from complications of a miscarriage.

Longfellow joined the faculty of Harvard in 1836 as a professor of modern languages. In 1843 he married Frances Appleton, a marriage that brought him great happiness and six children. In a tragic accident Frances died in 1861, shaking Longfellow to his core. As the Civil War began, Longfellow's son, Charles, enlisted in the Union Army, against his father's wishes, and in the Battle of Mine Run was severely wounded.

So: the world-famous poet who sat at his writing desk on Christmas Day 1863 was a man in emotional and spiritual torment. He was deeply depressed – over the death of his adored wife, over the devastating injuries suffered by his son, over the fratricidal Civil War that had torn asunder his cherished country. Here's what he wrote:



I heard the bells on Christmas Day Their old, familiar carols play, and mild and sweet The words repeat Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

And thought how, as the day had come, The belfries of all Christendom Had rolled along The unbroken song Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Till ringing, singing on its way, The world revolved from night to day, A voice, a chime, A chant sublime Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

Then from each black, accursed mouth
The cannon thundered in the South,
And with the sound
The carols drowned
Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

It was as if an earthquake rent The hearth-stones of a continent, And made forlorn The households born Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

And in despair I bowed my head; "There is no peace on earth," I said; "For hate is strong, And mocks the song Of peace on earth, good-will to men!"


Then pealed the bells more loud and deep:


